

Leeds Special Education Needs & Disability Information Advice Support Service (SEND IASS)

SENDIASS is an impartial, confidential service for parents, carers, young people and children. The service offer information, advice and support on:

- Helping children, young people and parents to gather, understand and interpret information and apply it to their own situation.
- Information on education law relating to Special Educational Needs (SEN) and related law on disability, health and social care, through suitably independently trained staff.
- Provide advice through individual casework and through work with parent carer support groups, or training events.
- Support when things go wrong through early disagreement resolution, mediation, routes of appeal and complaints procedures. This support could include information around:
- Early Help Looking at what support can be put in place if you feel your child has additional needs often referred to as SEN support in schools.
- Funding For Inclusion (FFI) Additional Financial
- Support for schools; for children with a high level of additional need
- Education and Health Care Plans (EHC)
- Educational settings in Leeds and Out of Authority
- Accessing the Local Offer
- Disagreement resolution and tribunals

They do this by:

- Listening to your questions and concerns
- Explaining the process of SEN support
- Supporting and advising around school meetings
- Explaining the Funding for Inclusion process (FFI)
- Supporting and advising around school visits
- Giving information and advice around disagreement resolution
- Supporting and advising around SEND tribunals
- Supporting you through statutory assessment processes
- Supporting and advising around annual reviews
- Signposting you to other services where necessary

The support can be delivered in a number of ways and casework to be agreed on an individual basis. It may include:

- Phone calls
- Emails
- Home visits
- School meetings
- Local authority meetings
- Working with parent carer support groups
- Local SEN groups
- Local disability groups or training events

To make a referral:

Parents, children and young people should self-refer via the helpline, email or by visiting the website. However, a professional can refer with the family's explicit consent.

We operate throughout the year during office hours. The helpline is guaranteed between the hours of 10-3pm on weekdays during term-time. An answer service is available throughout the year and a member of the team will respond to your queries. Please leave a brief message and your contact details; including name, number and postcode.

Willow Young Carers siblings support group took part in a residential weekend at Nell Bank outdoor education centre this summer. The sibs group supports young people who help to care for a brother or sister with a disability or illness. The monthly Saturday group has been running at Willow for over 18 months and the young people who attend have become good friends.

The group enjoyed a wonderful sunny weekend of fun and games, including an assault course, den building, pond dipping and adventure play. Service manager, Sylvia Shatwell said, "It was just great to see the young people having so much space to run round and enjoy themselves". Rania, who has been attending the group for over a year said, "I enjoyed working together on the assault course to get the water, chicken and bread to the other side. I also liked pond dipping because it was good to see the things that live in a pond". Other highlights included pizza, film night and the obligatory (and fully risk assessed) pillow fight before bedtime.

The weekend was supported by three Willow staff members and two of our amazing volunteers, Helen and Sara. The sibs group's next event is an art exhibition at the White Cloth Gallery in Leeds on 12 September to showcase some of the work produced during the group's painting project led by another volunteer, Alison.

Scrap Leeds

"A cave of wonderful delights for children and adults alike"

SCRAP the Centre of Reuse, Play and Learning, based in Sunnybank Mills, Farsley, is a social enterprise which has been running for nine years, diverting non-toxic business waste from landfill and making it available for creative reuse, play and learning.

Scrap offers arts, play and learning workshops and sessions for children, schools, families, adults and professionals held in their inspiring centre. Led by arts practitioners and creative learning professionals, these workshops all focus on using scrap creatively and learning new skills. Everyone is encouraged to look beyond the original use of an object, and let their imagination fly.

Recently shortlisted in the child friendly Leeds awards, some of the many who nominated Scrap described it as "a lovely place to be and an i nspiring place to go"; "If you haven't visited Scrap you must soon – just to see all the fabulous stuff and let your imagination run with the ideas of the possibilities" and "a fantastic place, not only is it helping with the environment by reusing stuff but it is a great safe place for kids to experiment and play". Customers include nurseries, schools, community groups, colleges and universities, arts organisations, individual artists and creative practitioners.

The inspiring Scrap Shop in Sunnybank Mills is stuffed to the rafters with a wide range of low cost scrap for learning and creative

resources from the 80 tonnes of business waste diverted back into use.



Louise Lucas, founder and Director of Scrap says, "We believe that creative learning through the experience of exploration and enquiry about what might happen when making art is just as important as other academic subjects. We know that you learn a lot through your mistakes and by trying something different. We strongly believe there is no wrong or right about art and creativity, and that confidence in creativity builds in you and in learning."



Karen Hirst, Children and Families Coordinator, Action for Blind People says "Our Actionnaires clubs offer a range of activities for blind and partially sighted young people and we are delighted to have discovered SCRAP! Being able to explore the wide and diverse range of materials on offer and then turn these into something amazing has enabled many of our club members to discover their creative sides. The tactile nature of the resources is perfect for visually impaired young people and the mill environment provides a safe but exciting venue. Our children have been lucky enough to attend a number of creative workshops at SCRAP – from storytelling and collages to messy, fun papermaking -all delivered by expert, friendly staff who have been sensitive to the specific needs of


our members. All in all, our experience of SCRAP has been really positive and we are looking forward to bringing along some new groups soon!"

Scrap services include:

- The ScrapShed for school playgrounds and early years settings, full of large scrap items and loose parts for playful learning as an imaginative alternative to directed games
- Arts workshops for children, young people, schools/ community groups, adults and families celebrating scrap
- Continuing professional development training focusing on creative learning for education professionals
- The Scrap Shop for a huge and constantly changing range of low cost inspirational scrap materials and




Pyramid of Arts

Pyramid of Arts runs inclusive art groups, open to young people aged eight and above. Our groups love inventing new games and stories, which they can build and share with the public.

We recently took our games The Deciding Machine and Jalicks to The Tetley Gallery. Loads of people came to play with them! The Deciding Machine explores choice and decision making through sensory exploration and Jalicks is a giant board game in which the players are the playing pieces. We also took our newest work, The Story Machine, which works like a 'choose your own adventure' story on a giant scale.

Buzz workshops

Buzz Workshops take place at First Floor, a safe, creative space for all young people. Buzz Workshops are for young people aged 14 to 25 with a learning disability or additional needs.

Where: We are above the Wardrobe Bar and opposite Leeds Bus Station.



Address: First Floor, 6 St Peter's Buildings, St Peter's Square, Leeds, LS9 8AH.



Access information: There is a lift to our studios; we have a hearing loop in reception and hoist facilities and a changing bed in our accessible toilet.



What's on and when: weekend workshops every Saturday in term time 1–3pm. Workshops are in music, drama and visual arts. All of our workshops have support workers in them but you can bring a PA or carer with you if you need 1:1 support.



Buzz Creative Arts Course in term time: An exciting creative arts course on Mondays and Tuesdays from 10-3pm each day. Taking part in workshops in movement, drama and visual arts, students work towards all levels of Arts Awards and build their confidence and skills.

First Floor is a really friendly place, we are part of West Yorkshire Playhouse, and we go to see shows at the theatre and sometimes get to perform on stage!

Current members have found the club to be a valuable social outlet, and have developed personal and creative skills.

The club will give you a chance to:

- Attend monthly workshops and performance opportunities
- Explore a rich variety of arts activities and work with a range of professional artists
- Access FREE tickets to performances and cultural events
- Contribute to the club activity programme and pursue personal development

When?

One Saturday each month, 10.00 – 1.00pm (including 1 hour socialising time with free tea and cake), September – June.

Performance visits take place during the year in addition to monthly Saturday sessions.

How much does it cost?
